ICHCA and the International Community Lose a True Leader

It is with the deepest sadness that ICHCA Australia acknowledges the passing of John Francis Roderick Strang A.O.

ICHCA honours and celebrates the life of John Strang, who died peacefully at home on 29 September after a long illness. He lived a life of purpose, of achievement and most importantly a life filled with great love - a deep love for family, friends, colleagues and for life itself.

John was a humble man and for him actions spoke far louder than words. He was an amazing Father, Husband, Grandfather, Friend, Mentor, Visionary, Entrepreneur, Chairman and Industry Leader. But most of all he was a wonderful human being.

Mr Strang was an ICHCA identity, Chairman and owner of the Strang-Tradex Group and was honoured for his service to the industry and community this year with an Officer of the Order of Australia in the 2016 Queen's Birthday Honours List. He was one of the most influential figures in the history of ICHCA and was Chairman of both ICHCA International and ICHCA Australia.

This publication reported some months ago that on his resignation from the ICHCA Australia Board, the current Board of Directors expressed their sincere appreciation for the tireless efforts Mr Strang has devoted to ICHCA over several decades.

ICHCA Australia Chairman, John Warda, said John Strang's influence and leadership within ICHCA, and in the cargo industry generally, spanned the globe and that he was an admired and respected industry leader globally.

"Mr Strang was a wonderful human being who brought something and more often much to everyone he met and he won't be forgotten. His legacy will live on, most importantly in how to conduct our lives and respect others with warmth, generosity and good humour."

Mr Strang led a life of distinguished service to the transport and logistics sector through executive roles in progressing industry development and to professional business organisations.



LEEA and ICHCA Publish Paper on the Safe Use of Container Lifting Lugs

04.10.2016 - ICHCA International, the NGO association for the global cargo handling industry is delighted to partner with LEEA, a Corporate Licensed ICHCA member and the professional body for the lifting industry worldwide, in order to contribute to safe practice in the industry. To that end, the two organisations have jointly released a new addition to ICHCA's Briefing Pamphlet series, BP42, which offers general guidance on the variety of container lifting lugs available and their safe use. The new publication was written by Ben Dobbs, Technical Manager at Lifting Equipment Engineers Association (LEEA), and reviewed by Capt.



Richard Brough OBE, Technical Adviser at ICHCA International. Both are active participants in ICHCA's ISP Technical Panel, which plays a key role in the association's technical research and advice programme.

When used correctly, container lifting lugs provide the user with a versatile and safe means of connecting a container to a lifting appliance in situations where it is not possible to use a container spreader or lifting frame. However, dangerous lifting practices can result if container lifting lugs are used in the wrong manner. Moreover, container lifting lugs are often confused with other fittings which are similar in construction but have been designed solely for load restraint use, and are not suitable for lifting.

Containing helpful illustration, BP42 provides information on standards and legislation and explores the various designs of the most common

container lifting lugs. The publication provides advice on storage and handling, inspection, maintenance, thorough inspection and documentation and marking. The paper concludes with advice for training users on the safe use of container lifting lugs, an important part in ensuring the safety of cargo, equipment and personnel as a whole along the supply chain.

"We are delighted to announce the release of this new joint publication from ICHCA's ISP Technical Panel and LEEA," said Rachael White, head of ICHCA International's secretariat. "As the voice of the global cargo handling industry, the expertise of ICHCA's technical panel and wider membership places us in an ideal position to help raise safety awareness and standards across international cargo handling chains."

BP42 – General guidance on the safe use of container lifting lugs is part of a series of more than 90 publications produced by ICHCA International, mainly through the organisation's ISP Technical Panel. The paper is free to download from ICHCA's website to subscribers.

Australian Shipbuilding and Repair Group: Dockmaster Course

The ASRG Dockmaster Course, or basic dry dock training course, is a four-day course that covers the fundamentals and calculations required for the docking of vessels, including for graving docks, floating docks, travel lifts etc, particularly for maintenance and repair.

The Australian Shipbuilding and Repair Group will conduct a Dockmaster Course in Sydney from 15-18 November.

The course begins with the basics and safety concerns and progresses through all phases of dry docking: preparation, docking, lay period and undocking. The course ends with an in-depth discussion regarding forward planning for the prevention of serious accidents and incidents, with details provided of past incidents. Qualifications are recognised internationally and are a stipulated requirement of Defence Departments and insurance assessors. The course is conducted internationally with courses held most recently in Singapore, the UK, Canada, UAE and the USA.

The course is designed to be relevant to Dockmasters, Docking Officers, Engineers, Naval Architects, Port Engineers and all others involved in the docking of vessels. The course is presented through classroom lectures, student participation in projects and practical application exercises. The course addresses the deck plate level of practical operation needed by the dock operator and the universally accepted mathematical calculations required to carry out operations in accordance with established sound engineering practices.

The course has accreditation with the Society of Naval Architects & Marine Engineers (SNAME) and The Royal Institution of Naval Architects (RINA) and is suitable for both experienced and inexperienced personnel with involvement in vessel docking.

Course Overview / Topics include:

- Basic dry docking community terminology
- Calculations
- Safe dry docking procedures
- Lay period
- Undocking evolutions
- Docking Plans
- Docking and undocking conferences
- Hull boards
- Vessel stability
- Incidents / Accidents.

Key Benefits of the Course:

- Understanding the art and science of drydocking ships and vessels
- Understanding different dry dock advantages and disadvantages
- Introduction to drydocking basics and safety concerns
- Comprehend universal drydocking and undocking calculations
- Hands-on course with student participation in projects and practical application exercises

The course leader is Joe Stiglich, a retired US Naval Officer, qualified NAVSEA (USN Naval Sea Systems Command) Docking Officer who holds a Masters of Science Degree from MIT (Massachusetts Institute of Technology) in Naval Architecture and Marine Engineering. He runs a series of training courses and conferences for personnel involved in all phases of the drydocking industry and acts as a consultant for ship repair companies.

Queensland Targets Biofutures Industry and Investors

The Queensland Government will test the US, Asian and Australian markets' appetite to be part of the state's potential \$1 billion biofutures industry with a Request for Information (RFI) advertising campaign to be followed by an Expression of Interest (EOI) process in the coming weeks.

State Development Minister, Dr Anthony Lynham, said the government would take the next step and identify serious proposals, to continue the investment and growth in a biofutures industry.

"We want to hear from companies all along the supply chain from potential suppliers of feedstock, technology providers, commercial operators, investors and users of bioproducts. This awareness raising campaign, which will run in the US, Asia and Australia will strengthen the government's understanding of the market and ultimately determine the most effective form of support it can offer."

Appointment of Ian Macfarlane to QRC

Former Federal Minister, Ian Macfarlane, is the new Chief Executive of the Queensland Resources Council. Mr Macfarlane has been a champion for the resources sector and understands the important role the industry plays in the Queensland economy. He will bring a wealth of knowledge to the QRC and as a former Federal Minister for Resources brings with him a great depth of experience in natural resources and the mining sector.

He replaces long-standing Chief Executive, Michael Roche, who is retiring after an influential career leading the organization.

Port of Townsville Posts Solid Result for 2015/16

Port of Townsville Limited (POTL) has recorded a strong net profit of \$17.72 million for the 2015/16 financial year. 9.79 million tonnes of goods moved through POTL's ports during 2015/16, with record trade numbers achieved for zinc ferrite, fertiliser and refined copper exports as well as zinc concentrate imports.

More than 1.3 million tonnes of sugar was exported out of Townsville and Lucinda during the period, ensuring that POTL retained its mantle as Australia's largest exporter of the commodity.

POTL Chief Executive Officer, Ranee Crosby, said the result was pleasing when taking into account the economic pressures faced by the region during 2015/16. "In a year that presented many challenges for the economy of North Queensland, POTL has maintained a strong focus on containing costs, improving the efficiency and capacity of existing assets and pursuing new trade opportunities," she said.

"This focus on improving existing operations saw the completion of \$26 million of infrastructure projects during the financial year, including the demolition of the century old Berth 6/7, upgrades of pylons at Berth 8/9, upgrades to road networks for multi-combination vehicles and harbour entrance works to improve navigational safety.

"While overall trade throughput declined mainly due to the closure of the Yabulu nickel refinery, financial performance remained almost on par with the previous year."
